This resource directory is a product of the Illinois Asthma Partnership's School and Education Workgroup. - School Health

- *American Lung Association in Illinois*
 - **Asthma 101™ What You Need To Know** is a comprehensive educational program that provides basic information about asthma and its management. It is also designed for use in a variety of settings, including schools, child care and sports. The one-hour program is delivered by trained health care professionals. At this time, the program offers a detailed, 60-page, full-color handbook along with asthma triggers and management posters.

 - **Asthma-Friendly Schools Initiative®** provides a framework and tools that communities and schools can use to develop a comprehensive approach to asthma management, including planning tools, policy recommendations and education programs.  - **Open Airways For Schools®** More than 40,000 U.S. schools have used this program to educate children ages 8-11 about asthma. The program strives to improve self-management skills, decrease asthma emergencies, raise awareness among parents and promote broader asthma management coordination among students, parents and schools. Six, 40-minute sessions incorporate group discussion, stories, games and role play. Topics include: basic asthma education, getting exercise, doing well at school, identifying and controlling asthma triggers, understanding asthma medicines, and recognizing and managing asthma symptoms. - **Respiratory Health Association of Greater Chicago**
 - **Fight Asthma Now® (FAN)** is a validated program that teaches children and teens how to understand and manage their asthma. Over the course of four, 45-minute sessions, asthma educators use engaging and active lesson plans to give students the tools and knowledge they need to identify and to avoid triggers, to properly use medications, to manage asthma episodes and to control asthma on a long-term basis. <http://www.lungchicago.org/fight-asthma-now/>
 - **Asthma Management** is a one-hour program for parents, teachers and other caregivers on how to care for children or adults living with asthma.  - **Asthma-friendly Childcare** teaches traditional and home daycare providers how to care for and offer a safe facility for children with asthma. Certified asthma educators (AE-Cs) develop the curriculum based on current guidelines, and includes lectures, case studies, small group discussions, hands-on demonstrations and an exhibit hall. Participants receive asthma resources including educational information and sponsor-provided materials. Continuing education units are provided to attendees.
