

# **Maternal Oral Health Practices PRAMS 2017-2019**



## **Background**

Receiving oral health care and education during pregnancy is important both for the health of women and for their children's oral health.¹ Pregnant women may develop gingivitis, where their gums swell and bleed easily. If left untreated, gingivitis may lead to a more severe gum disease. Most dental work (e.g., teeth cleaning, dental X-rays, filling of a decayed tooth) is safe during pregnancy, and regular teeth cleanings before and during pregnancy can help protect against gum diseases.¹-3

The Pregnancy Risk Assessment Monitoring System (PRAMS) collects site-specific, population-based data on maternal experiences and behaviors before, during, and shortly after pregnancy. Women are sampled for PRAMS between two and six months after having a live birth. Illinois PRAMS met or exceeded the response rate threshold set by the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) for years included in this report.

## **Teeth Cleaning Before Pregnancy**

Women who had their teeth cleaned by a dentist or dental hygienist in the 12 months before pregnancy, among women who had a health care visit during that period.

Question: In the 12 *months before* you got pregnant with your new baby, did you have any health care visits with a doctor, nurse, or other health care workers, including a dental or mental health worker? Response: Yes

Question: What type of health care visit did you have in the 12 months before you got pregnant with your new baby? Response: Visit to have my teeth cleaned by a dentist or dental hygienist.

### Information from Health Care Worker about Maternal Oral Health

Women who were advised by a doctor, nurse, or other health care worker to visit a dentist or dental hygienist before pregnancy.\*

Question: *Before* you got pregnant with your new baby, did a doctor, nurse, or other health care worker talk to you about preparing for a pregnancy? Response: Yes

Question: *Before* you got pregnant with your new baby, did a doctor, nurse, or other health care worker talk with you about any of the things listed below about preparing for a pregnancy? Response: Visiting a dentist or dental hygienist before pregnancy.

## **Teeth Cleaning During Pregnancy**

Women who had their teeth cleaned by a dentist or dental hygienist during their most recent pregnancy.

Question: During *your most recent* pregnancy, did you have your teeth cleaned by a dentist or dental hygienist? Response: Yes

## **Summary**

#### Before pregnancy:

- From 2017 to 2019, about 6 of 10 women had their teeth cleaned in the 12 months before pregnancy.
- Annually from 2017 to 2019, women with Medicaid insurance were **significantly** less likely to have their teeth cleaned before pregnancy, compared to women with private insurance.
- Annually from 2017 to 2019, women with a high school education were significantly less likely to have their teeth cleaned before pregnancy, compared to women with more than a high school education.
- From 2017 to 2019, non-Hispanic Black and Hispanic women were increasingly less likely to have their teeth cleaned in the 12 months before pregnancy, compared to non-Hispanic White women with Hispanic women showing a marked decline. By 2019, both non-Hispanic Black and Hispanic women were **significantly** less likely to have their teeth cleaned, compared to non-Hispanic White women.
- Less than half of women attending a health care visit before pregnancy received information from their health care worker to visit a dentist or dental hygienist in preparation for pregnancy.

### **During pregnancy:**

- From 2017 to 2019, less than half of women had their teeth cleaned during pregnancy.
- In 2018 and 2019, non-Hispanic Blacks and Hispanics were **significantly** less likely to have their teeth cleaned during pregnancy compared to non-Hispanic Whites.
- Annually from 2017 to 2019, less than one-third of women with Medicaid insurance had their teeth cleaned during pregnancy, which is **significantly** less compared to those with private insurance.
- Annually from 2017 to 2019, less than one-third of women with a high school or less than high school
  education had their teeth cleaned during pregnancy, which is significantly less compared to those
  with more than a high school education.
- Annually from 2017 to 2019, women under 30 years of age were less likely to have their teeth cleaned during pregnancy, compared to women over 30 years of age.
