The Health Equity Zone Model

The Health Equity Zone (HEZ) Model

Long-standing health inequities are fueled by differences in the social, environmental, and economic determinants of health.

Focus on equity in public health strategies and interventions (i.e., providing support based on *need* and *circumstances*)

Leverage **local assets and infrastructure** to disseminate public health funding across communities

Structured as **community-engaged collaboratives** that develop into self-sustaining, self-funding entities

Collaboratives develop action plans that address the **social determinants of health**, root causes of health inequities

What is a Health Equity Zone...?



...a hyper-local geographic area <u>within</u> <u>existing IDPH regions</u>

where opportunities to address health inequities emerge and investments towards this goal are made.


What is a Health Equity Zone...?

Technical Definition

 A <u>collaborative of multi-sectoral partnerships</u> existing in a <u>contiguous</u> <u>geographic area</u> that demonstrates measurable and documented health disparities and poor health outcomes (which may include but are not limited to high rates of maternal complications, newborn health complications, and chronic and infectious disease), contains <u>populations that experience health disparities</u>, and is <u>small enough</u> <u>for targeted interventions</u> to have a significant impact on health outcomes and health disparities.

Example & Impact of Other HEZ Initiatives

- Chicago (2021); funded 6 HEZs
- Activities
 - Citywide vaccination outreach and access programming.
 - Citywide distribution of fentanyl test kits
 - Collaborated with restaurants to create diabetesfriendly menus.
- Results
 - Completion of over 7,000 community surveys.
 - Contact with 162,000 residents with vaccination outreach materials.
 - Distribution of over 25,000 fentanyl test kits.
 - 6 restaurants developed diabetes-friendly menus.



Tailoring the HEZ Model to Illinois

Gathered insights from LHDs and other organizations from all 6 IDPH regions. Surveys or interviews were completed by respondents from 66 of the 102 counties in Illinois.

- Applicants will need <u>one dedicated IDPH or UIC staff</u> <u>member identified to answer questions</u> during the application process.
- IDPH should give special consideration and support to <u>underserved regions</u>, particularly rural areas and areas with limited access to the Internet.
- Most organizations do not have the capacity to add additional programming. The initiative should <u>allow</u> <u>funding to be used to pay staff positions</u> with clear communication about how long funding will last.
- Organizations best suited to lead an HEZ may differ from region to region, and different types of organizations have very different ideas about who should lead an HEZ. <u>The</u> <u>program should be flexible about who can lead an HEZ</u>.
- There is a **need for technical assistance and educational resources** for applicants and awardees.

The IL HEZ Pilot

Program Structure & Objectives

Program Structure

- IDPH will support the development of **two pilot HEZs** in the state.
- The HEZs will exist within existing IDPH regions
 - Geographical defined by city, county, zip code, etc.
 - May be a cluster of contiguous geographic areas (e.g., multiple cities, counties, or zip codes).
- There are two-phases of program activities, but funding for Phase 2 is contingent on successful completion of Phase 1
 - Initial Funding Period: January 1, 2025 June 30, 2025
 - Maximum budget per HEZ: \$500,000

Program Objectives

- Successful applications will include detailed plans for Phase 1, the development of the HEZ, and a **<u>budget for the entire project</u>**.
- In the Work Plan, you will also be asked for your <u>initial</u> plans for Phase 2 (which may be revised at the end of Phase 1).
- Funding for Phase 2 will be contingent upon successful completion of the Phase 1 activities and the availability of funding.

Eligibility Information

Eligible applicants are organizations **interested in becoming the lead organization of a local health equity zone**.

- The lead organization will build and/or grow a multi-sectoral collaborative of 3 or more partner organizations who work in a common geographical area (e.g., defined by zip codes, counties, cities) and conceived of by the applicant.
- Together, the lead organization, their partner organizations and the geographic area covered make up the health equity zone.

Local health departments or community-based organizations are eligible to be a lead organization.

 If a local health department is <u>not</u> the lead organization, <u>there must be at least one local health</u> <u>department among the partner organizations within a proposed collaborative</u>.

Applicants <u>do not</u> need to have selected all of the partner organizations in their proposed collaborative upon submission of the application.

Eligibility Information

Lead organization: An organization that has <u>the capacity to manage the fiscal responsibilities</u> associated with this grant. The lead organization should be physically located within the proposed HEZ they are leading.

- Possible applicants:
 - Corporation Not for Profit
 - Government Entity (e.g., local health department)
 - University/Community College

Partner organization: An organization located within the HEZ that <u>works with the lead organization to provide</u> <u>specific skills, knowledge, and community connections</u> in order to make work within the HEZ successful.

- Possible partners:
 - Any type of organization/entity

Budget (15 points)

Proposed budget should focus on Phase 1 and Phase 2.

BUT Phase 2 funding is contingent on successful completion of Phase 1 and the availability of funds.

Please keep in mind:

- The HEZ's lead organization (i.e., applicant) will manage the budget, purchases, subcontracts, etc.
- Subcontractor information must be entered into EGrAMS when entering budget details.
- Funds: Some costs are not allowable under this grant. Please carefully read the NOFO for an explanation of which costs are allowed and which are not.

Regarding Phase 1...

- Budget should be detailed in justifying expenses for Phase 1 (developing your collaborative and conducting needs assessment).
- It is important when budgeting for phase 1 to ensure that you leave enough **funding for implementation and evaluation in phase 2**.
- Funding allocated to Phase 1 should be less than the amount allocated to Phase 2.

Regarding Phase 2...

- You will propose a budget that includes **your best guess for the** <u>allocation of costs for Phase 2</u>; this budget will be reevaluated at the end of Phase 1.
- In the budget narrative, please distinguish between Phase 1 and Phase 2 costs.

Budget (15 points)

Proposed budget should focus on Phase 1 and Phase 2.

BUT Phase 2 funding is contingent on successful completion of Phase 1 and the availability of funds.


- It is recommended that applicants <u>allocate no more than \$100,000 to \$150,000</u>
 <u>for Phase 1 (i.e., planning) activities</u> so that adequate funding remains for
 Phase 2 (i.e., implementation) activities.
- In addition, when developing budgets, please ensure that funding is distributed between the lead organization and partner organizations in a way that recognizes the additional responsibilities that will be required of the lead organization (e.g., fiscal management of the grant).

Health Equity Checklist (35 points)

- When completing the IDPH Health Equity Checklist, please keep in mind that the "intervention strategy" to reflect on in your response is <u>the</u> <u>formation of your HEZ collaborative</u>.
- An assessment of the health equity focus of specific interventions developed by funded HEZ collaboratives (i.e., the HEZ's action plan) will occur at the end of Phase 1 of this initiative.

Prioritized Applicant (9 points)

Prioritized applicant (up to 9 pts of overall score)

- 1. HEZs in IL counties designated as having medium-high to high levels of social vulnerability according to <u>CDC/ATSDR SVI</u>. (3 points)
- 2. HEZs in IL counties designated as rural by IDPH (3 points)
- Applications for which the lead organization is an LHD that is in the bottom 25th percentile of IDPH operating budget. (3 points)

A complete list of counties qualifying for SVI and rurality points is included in the NOFO. Qualification for the 3rd priority area will be determined by IDPH after the application deadline
